#### The Superhero: In Crown Heights, Krypton and Within Each of Us

As our summer vacation was winding down I looked back and realized that we had accomplished many of the things that I had hoped to check off my "Summer 2025 Vacation Bucket List". Visit family and friends in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut? Check. Paint pottery with our daughter Shoshana and go to a New York Yankees game with our son Eitan? Check. We visited Coney Island and the Ann Frank exhibit currently at the Center for Jewish History in Manhattan. I got to tour two different lighthouses. (Ask me about the Twin Lights Lighthouse.) On the day before Eitan and I flew back to Florida (Rebecca left a day earlier) there were only two items left on the summer vacation bucket list that I considered doing. When I shared the items with Eitan and he was on board our itinerary was set for the last day of vacation. That morning we drove to Cambria Heights in Queens, NY to visit the Ohel, the gravesite of Rabbi Menachem Mendel Schneerson; and that afternoon we went to Regal Theatres in Lynbrook Long Island to see the new Superman movie. While at the time I thought we were just checking off two last items on my vacation bucket list, I realized the connection between these two figures runs deeper. On an obvious level, we can learn that not all superheroes wear capes; some wear black hats and black frocks. And as I reflected upon my day more I realized that there is much for us to learn from the real life superhero of Crown Heights and the fictional superhero of Krypton

Though I had met the Rebbe once when he was alive, I had never visited the Ohel, which is also the final resting place of the Rebbe's mother, his wife, his mother-in-law, and his father-in-law and predecessor Rabbi Yosef Yitzchak Schneerson. I'm not sure why it took me 33 year to visit the Rebbe's grave. It's especially hard for me understand in light of the fact that I am not averse to visiting cemeteries and that I feel a strong connection to the Rebbe and to Chabad Chasidut, I had met the Rebbe when I was a child. One summer I attended Camp Gan Israel day camp in New Haven, CT and the camp arranged for us 8 year old boys to spend a weekend in Crown Heights, NY, near the Chabad headquarters. As I reflect on my memories of that experience as an adult I now realize that my definition of human greatness as one who cares about individuals and about small details is something that I felt in a profound way from the Rebbe. This attention to detail is a characteristic that is exhibited by Superman, a character created by two Jewish teenagers (Jerry Siegel and Joe Shuster) over 90 years ago in Cleveland, OH. No matter the degree of mayhem and destruction that the villains rain down on Metropolis, Superman is careful to protect and save every single life; from the one woman whose car is stuck on a collapsing bridge, and even a lone squirrel in the path of danger.

While it may seem that the plot of all Superman tales is the battle between good and evil, between Superman and the villains, the real story is always the superhero's internal struggle as Superman tries to figure out who he really is. Is he the son of the planet Krypton with superhuman strength, or is he the son of Smallville, Kansas, with all of the insecurities and weaknesses that all humans feel? Does nature or nurture play most prominently in Superman's persona? What is more important for Superman's identity: where he came from or where he is going? (I'm trying my best to avoid divulging any spoilers from the newest movie.)

The Lubavitcher Rebbe taught that every human being must similarly struggle with a dual identity. On the one hand we are physical mortals, and on the other hand we possess a divine soul. These two identities can at times pull us in different directions and leave us unsure how to act. The Rebbe would often teach people and remind his Chasidim that we are not physical beings that occasionally have spiritual experiences. Rather due to the presence of our souls, whose source is the Divine, we are primarily spiritual beings with some necessary physical qualities and needs. According to the Rebbe each of us has a superpower; a talent, strength an ability that is unique to each individual. Our purpose in life is to cultivate and maximize that Godgiven ability in ways that better ourselves and positively contribute to the world around us. We figure out who we are by getting in touch with our souls and with ourselves. One way to get in touch with ourselves is by talking to ourselves. Some people say that only crazy people talk to themselves. Other people say that talking to yourself is one of the few ways to ensure an interesting conversation. The Rebbe would encourage people to talk to themselves in order to answer their

#### Our Annual Checkup

One of the most well-known converts to Judaism was Onkelos, the author of Targum Onkelos, the authoritative Aramaic translation of the Torah. The Gemara (Avodah Zara 11a) recounts a remarkable story surrounding his conversion:

The Roman Emperor, Titus, sent a brigade of soldiers to bring him back to Rome. But when Onkelos engaged the soldiers in discussion and showed them the beauty of Torah, they converted to Judaism. Titus then sent another brigade, instructing them not to speak to Onkelos. But after they listened to what he had to say without him even speaking to them, they too converted to Judaism. Finally, Titus sent a third brigade and instructed them not even to listen to Onkelos.

When they were leading Onkelos back to Rome, he placed his hand on the mezuzah and inquisitively asked, "What is this?" "You tell us," the soldiers said. He replied, "Normally, a human king sits inside and his servants stand outside and guard him. But, Hashem, His servants are inside and He guards them from the outside, as the verse says, 'God will guard your going out and coming in from now and forever (Tehillim 121)." They too converted. Titus did not send any more soldiers.

This powerful story is the basis for a custom cited by the Rema (Yoreh De'ah 285:2):

#### בשאדם יוצא מן הבית יניח ידו על המזוזה, ויאמר: ה' ישמר צאתי וכו׳. וכן כשיכנס אדם לבית, יניח ידו על המזוזה

Some say that when you leave the house you should place your hand on the mezuzah and say "God guard my going out etc.". .Similarly when entering you should place your hand on the mezuzah.

Not only is the mezuzah a visibly recognizable sign of a Jewish home, the mezuzah as a container of jewish fundamentals, can inspire one to higher levels of spiritual attainment.

Although, strictly speaking, one need not inspect the kashrus of one's mezuzos annually (see Halichos Shlomo: Tefilla 4), the Kitzur Shulchan Aruch (128:3) writes that it is customary to check one's mezuzos during the month of Elul. Although Elul is a natural time to check the kashrus of the mezuzah in advance of the New Year, perhaps there is another dimension to this custom.

The Rambam writes regarding what one should be contemplating when passing a mezuzah (Hilchos Mezuzah 6:13):

#### וכל זמו שיכנס ויצא יפגע ביחוד השם שמו של הקדוש ב"ה ויזכור אהבתו ויעור משנתו ושגיותיו בהבלי הזמן

*Each time that one enters and leaves [his home] he should concentrate* on the Oneness of the Name of Hashem, and remember His love, and be aroused from his sleep and his mistaken involvement in the meaningless use of time...This thought will immediately restore him to his right senses, and he will walk in the paths of righteousness.

I find it fascinating how this language is strikingly similar to the Rambam's words (Hilchos Teshuva 3:4) where he explains the purpose of the shofar:

רמז יש בו כלומר עורו ישינים משנתכם ונרדמים הקיצו מתרדמתכם וחפשו במעשיכם וחזרו בתשובה וזכרו בוראכם, אלו השוכחים את האמת בהבלי הזמן

It is as if [the shofar's call] is saying: Wake up you sleepy ones from your sleep ... Those who forget the truth in the vanities of time and throughout the entire year, devote their energies to vanity and emptiness which will not benefit or save: Look to your souls...

Both the mezuzah and the shofar, two mitzvos that take on heightened significance during Elul, serve as spiritual alarms, designed to snap us out of our spiritual sleep and help to orient our priorities. The shofar provides a powerful, daily wake-up call. The mezuzah, in contrast, offers countless subtle reminders placed at every threshold of transition throughout the day.

Like an alarm clock, the shofar gives us the daily jolt in the morning and the mezuzah provides us with constant opportunities to stay true to our convictions.

This idea is reflected in the etymology of the word "mezuzah" as described in the Zohar (Zohar 3:300b):

> מזזות אותיות ז"ז מו"ת שלא נתן רשות למשחית לחבל וזז מפתחו.

# FACTS I DISCOVERED WHILE LOOKING UP OTHER THINGS

#### RABBI EDWARD DAVIS

#### MARTEF HASHOAH, CHAMBER OF THE HOLOCAUST.

This is a small Holocaust museum that was established on Mt. Zion adjacent to the Old City in Yerushalayim. It was started in December 1949 by some Holocaust survivors and formally endorsed and worked by the Minister of Religious Affairs Rabbi Dr. Samuel Zangvil Kahane. In the museum were placed ashes from a concentration camp, parts of a desecrated Torah scroll from Nazi Europe. There is a memorial for more than 2,000 Jewish communities. There is a bloodstained Torah scroll and a handwritten Siddur from Buchenwald and a coat sewn from Torah parchment that was worn by a Nazi officer. And there is RIF soap made from human fat. When Yad Vashem opened in the early 50's some artifacts were transferred from this small museum. The museum is open each day for a half day. It is right beneath the Diaspora Yeshivah which cares for the property.

RABBEINU YONAH. Rabbi Yonah ben Avraham Gerondi (1200-1263, Spain) was a brilliant Talmudist, and a cousin of the Ramban. He was initially involved with the anti Rambam movement, against the Rambam's philosophy. He helped initiate the public burning of the works of the Rambam in Paris by the Catholics in 1233. He would travel from city to city speaking against the Rambam's writings. Later he would see the error in his ways and took a vow that he would go to Tiveria, Israel and gather a Minyan, lie on the Rambam's grave every day for a week and beg forgiveness for what he did. He left France and when he reached Toledo, Spain, he was convinced by the Jewish community to settle there (temporarily). He built a Yeshivah and then suddenly died of a mysterious illness. The word spread that he died there due to his not fulfilling his vow. Later his body was transferred and buried next to the Rambam.

SUPERMAN IS JEWISH. Superman was created by Joe Schuster and Jerry Siegel, both Jewish, in 1938. If you are not convinced that Superman was Jewish, consider that he came to America from Krypton, where his name was Kal-El, Hebrew for an Easy God. In the current 2025 Superman movie, our hero is played by David Corenswet, a Jewish guy from Philadelphia. His love interest in the movie is Lois Lane, played by actress Rachel Brosnahan, also Jewish. Corenswet was turned on to acting when he saw his sister in a production of Fiddler on the Roof. He is proud of his Jewish heritage even though he married a Christian woman in a church, officiated by a minister and a Reform rabbi. [Oh well, it sounded pretty good.]

JOSEPH TRUMPELDOR, PART II. Although he is heralded as a Jewish hero, he was not successful in his military or political career. The one-armed military leader was courageous and valiant, a true leader, but the efforts in creation the Zion Mule Corps and involvement in World War I did not last. He was instrumental in convincing many Russian Jews to make Aliyah. Making it to

Israel after the Big War, he immediately involved himself in the military end of the Zionist movement. In the end of 1919:David Ben Gurion asked Trumpeldor to help in the defense of Tel Hai in the Galilee. In March 1920, Trumpeter was severely injured in the abdomen. To his doctor, it is said that he told him that "It's nothing; it's worth dying for the country." He died then. He never married. Engaged twice, he was never idle enough to tie the knot.

ALAYNU. This prayer ends each service in our ritual. There are different versions of its origin. According to one tradition, it was composed by Yehoshua upon the conquest of Yericho. Another opinion assigns its authorship to the Amora Ray, the third century Babylonian scholar, because he is credited with arranging the entire Rosh Hashanah Mussaf. The prayer did not become part of the daily prayers until probably around the year 1300. A Baptized Jew in the year 1400 spread the rumor that one line slurred Christianity. He said that the numerical value of the word VARIK (emptiness) is 316, the same as Yeshu, the Hebrew name of Jesus. The Christian censors insisted that the line be deleted (in the early 18th century). Some Ashkenazic rabbis started to restore the line in the beginning of the 20th century. Sephardim were uneffected by this problem.

AN EARLY ABORTED TALMUD. In 1842, a new edition of the Talmud (Berachot) was published in Germany. The text is clear; the text and commentaries are vocalized. The editor was Dr. E. M. Pinner who added his own commentary, which I presume were written in German. The German translation and commentary were expertly done, but there were no more volumes printed. Perhaps this was because Pinner dedicated his work to Czar Nicholas I, "high-minded protector of every pure aspiration," who in fact was so anti-Semitic a monarch that the Jews in his realm dubbed him "Haman II." This volume is located in the American Library of Congress in the Hebrew section.

of times as Scholar in Residence. Rabbi Weinreb was in his early 30's when he experienced (in his words) an early mid-life crisis. He had received his PhD in psychology and was working in a school. He was also teaching shiurim at a local shul in Maryland. Rabbi Weinreb didn't know where to focus his talents and attention. Should he further his career in psychology or shift to synagogue rabbinics? He also had questions concerning the education of his children and general philosophical questions about Judaism and life. At the suggestion of a Chabad friend, Rabbi Weinreb decided to pick up the phone and call the Rebbe's office one day in February 1971. The Rebbe's secretary picked up the phone and asked "Who is this?" Rabbi Weinreb replied "A Yid (Jew) from Maryland". He went on to explain why he was calling and listed off his questions. As he was talking, the secretary was translating into Yiddish for the Rebbe. When he was finished, Rabbi Weinreb heard the Rebbe in the background say, ""Tell him that there is a Jew who lives in Maryland that he can speak to. Der yid hayst Veinreb—his name is Weinreb." Rabbi Weinreb couldn't believe what he heard, so he asked the secretary to repeat what the Rebbe had said. The secretary repeated the Rebbe's words "There's a Jew in Maryland whom he should talk to. His name is Weinreb." Startled and surprised, Rabbi Weinreb replied over the phone "But I am Weinreb." The Rebbe must have heard this because he the said, "If that's the case, then he should know that, sometimes, one needs to speak to himself." With that the call ended. Rabbi Weinreb reflects on this unlikely turn of events:

"I believe I understood what the Rebbe was trying to tell me. If I could put words in his mouth, he was saying, "You're looking for answers

outside yourself. You're not a kid anymore; you're a man. You are thirty years old, you are a father, you are a teacher of Torah. You have to have more self-confidence. It's time to grow up and listen to yourself. Don't be so dependent on others. Trust yourself."

Talking to ourselves may seem like a daunting task, but the Torah has provided us with an outlet to do so on a daily basis: Prayer. The most common Hebrew term for prayer is "Tefilah". The verb form is "L'Hitpallel" which is a reflexive form of a verb that means to evaluate or to speak. Prayer is an opportunity for us to talk to ourselves and to evaluate to what extent are the values and priorities expressed in our tefilot find expression in our thoughts, words and deeds? In Tefilah we say that God is the source of health and healing. Our prayers emphasize the importance of knowledge, forgiveness, and redemption. Do we live lives that prioritize these values or are our prayers merely lip service? If we wore a superhero custom I suggest that we would also have an "S" on our chest- and that S would stand for "Shema". It is a prayer that we recite multiple times each day and it is an ongoing reminder of the unity of existence and how Hashem is the source and the inspiration for everything that happens.

Let us appreciate the importance- really, the necessity, of prayer in our daily lives. Prayer is a gift. It is an opportunity to talk to Hashem. It is also an opportunity to talk to ourselves. Let us commit to prayer in quantity and in quality; whether we daven three times a day with a minyan or once a day in private.

Each of us has the potential to be Super. Let us never forget that tefilah is a great opportunity for us to talk to ourselves with the goal of actualizing the superhero within each of us.

"Mezuzot" consists of the letters "zaz mavet" (move death) because it ensures that the destroyer will have no permission to attack, and will leave the doorway.

While there are mystical elements of protection associated with the mezuzah, we might also understand this more simply: the mezuzah protects us from a far more subtle danger - spiritual disconnection. It reminds us to stay attached to eternal truths, and not, God forbid, to that which leads to spiritual decline.

Interestingly, when affixing a mezuzah, the beracha we recite is, "...who sanctified us with His mitzvot and commanded us to affix a mezuzah." This seems somewhat strange, as the term mezuzah literally means "doorpost." The mitzvah, however, is to affix a parchment containing the paragraphs of Shema onto the doorpost, not to install a doorpost itself. Wouldn't it make more sense for the bracha to say, "...commanded us to affix <u>His name</u> to the doorpost"? Why, then, do we refer to the object we place on the doorpost as if it is the doorpost?

Rabbi Yaakov Tzvi Mecklenburg, in his *HaKetav VeHaKabbalah*, offers a fascinating insight. He explains that the root of the word *mezuzah* is *zaz*, meaning "to move." For example, money is called *zuzim* because it moves and circulates. A doorway is called a *mezuzah* because people pass through it, they move.

The mezuzah is placed on the doorpost and referred to as a mezuzah to symbolize a person's movement through life. As we move throughout our days and lives, the mezuzah on our doorpost serves as a reminder that through all these transitions, we must conduct ourselves in accordance with the principles of the Torah.

We attach God's name, our love for Him, and our commitment

to Torah to every aspect of our lives. The mitzvah of placing a mezuzah is not a one-time task to be forgotten once the case is nailed to the doorpost. The mezuzah serves as a continual reminder not to move through life on autopilot. Rather, it is about *likboa mezuzah* embedding God's presence into our daily routines and actions. That's why the bracha we recite is "to affix a mezuzah", not just physically placing it, but integrating its message into our lives.

During the month of Elul, we begin reciting *Selichos*, which include the oft-repeated words: "*Lo b'chessed v'lo b'maasim banu lefanekha*" — "We come before You, Hashem, not with special merit of kindness or deeds." "*Ke'dalim ve'rashim dafaknu d'latecha*" -"We knock on Your door like the poor and the destitute."

The great Kabbalist, the Arizal, taught that the *dal* (poor) and *rash* (destitute) represent the months of Tammuz and Av, the months of mourning and fasting for the destruction of Yerushalayim and the Beis Hamikdash. Building on this, the Chassidic master, the *Bnei Yissaschar*, explains that if Tammuz and Av symbolize poverty and loss, then the next month, Elul, is represented by the *delet* - the door.

After experiencing the spiritual desolation of Tammuz and Av, we enter Elul with a new posture: we approach, now standing before His door, ready to knock, ready to return. Elul becomes the door through which we seek to re-enter closeness with Hashem. As we move through the Elul portal and hear the shofar, let's be moved. As we touch the mezuzah, let's be touched. Because, perhaps more important than checking the mezuzah in Elul is checking in with ourselves. Wishing us all a meaningful and truly "Elul-vating" journey!

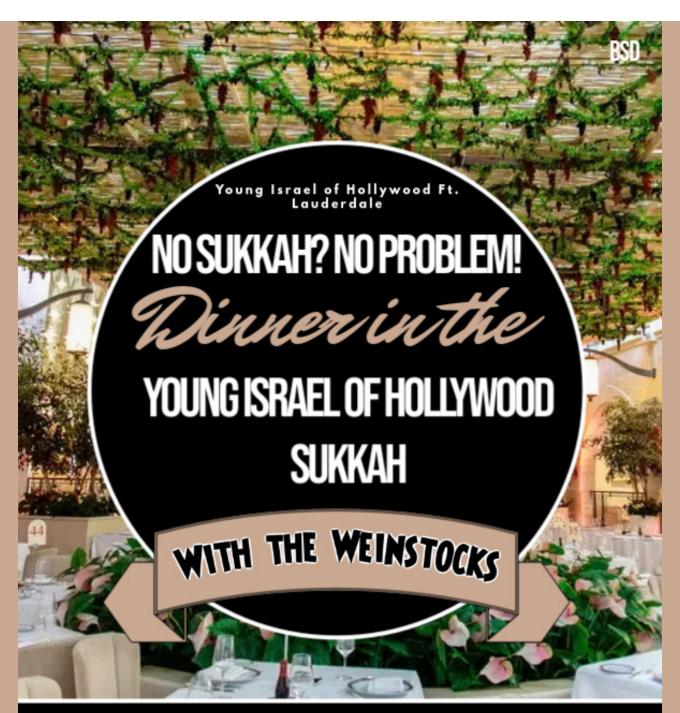

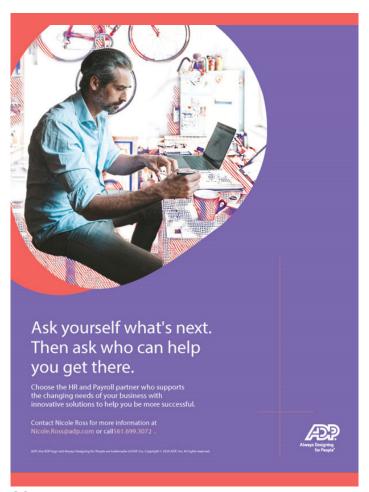

#### HIGH HOLIDAY LAWS & CUSTOMS



#### **EREV ROSH HASHANAH**

- 1. We do not blow Shofar on Erev Rosh HaShanah, thereby distinguishing between the optional Shofar blasts of the month of Elul from the Mitzvah (obligatory) Shofar blasts on Rosh HaShanah.
- 2. To prepare for this special holiday, there is a custom for men to go to the Mikveh before Yom Tov.
- 3. The Selichot (penitential prayers) of Erev Rosh HaShanah are lengthy.
- 4. Men and women annul their vows (Hatarat Nedarim). The annulment can be performed anytime during Tishrei and even after Yom Kippur. The formula is found in many Siddurim (p. 762 in the ArtScroll Siddur.) We normally annul our vows immediately after davening on Erev Rosh HaShanah.

#### **ROSH HASHANAH**

1. It is customary to have round Challahs on this holiday and to dip the Challah in honey before eating. This is also done with the apple right after saying Hamotzi and eating the Challah. One must say a Borei Pri Ha'etz on the apple. After eating the apple one says:

*Yehi ratzon shetchadesh aleinu shanah tovah u'metukah* May it be Your will that this year be good and sweet.

- 2. Some have additional customs of:
  - a. eating only sweet things and abstaining from bitter foods like horseradish
  - b. not eating nuts because of its numerical connection in Hebrew to the word sin (Chet and Egoz)
  - c. eating *pomegranates* (may Hashem multiply our *Zchuyot* privileges as He has multiplied the seeds of the pomegranate)
  - d. eating *dates* (saying: May it be Your will that our enemies shall be silenced)
  - e. eating *squash* (saying: May it be Your will that the evil decree shall be torn and our merits shall be read before You)
  - f. eating *carrots* (*tzimmis*) or *blackeyed peas* (saying: May it be Your will that our merits be multiplied)
  - g. eating *leeks* (saying: May it be Your will that our enemies be restrained)
  - h. eating *marigold*, *spinach*, or *beets* (saying: May it be Your will that evil shall vanish)
  - i. eating *fish* (saying: May it be Your will that we should multiply and be plentiful as fish)
  - j. eating the *head of a fish or sheep* (saying: May Klal Yisrael be at the head and not at the bottom-tail)
  - k. not to sleep during the day.
- 3. On the first day of Rosh HaShanah, we recite *Tashlich* near a body of water. If one is not able to do so on Yom Tov, one may recite *Tashlich* any time during *Aseret Yemei Teshuva* and even until *Hoshana Rabba*.

- 4. We should end our services before midday on *Rosh HaShanah* since it is not a fast day. We should start our holiday meal by midday.
- 5. On the first night of *Rosh Hashanah* we wish one another: *L'Shanah tovah teekatev v'taychatem* (May you be inscribed and sealed for a good year)
- 6. On the **second night**, one should have a **new fruit** available in order to apply the *Shehechiyanu* in *Kiddush* on the new fruit. If no new fruit or clothing is present, *Shehechiyanu* is still recited as part of *Kiddush*.
- 7. Instead of *Ha'El HakAdosh* in *Shemoneh Esrei*, we recite *HaMelech HaKadosh* from Rosh Hashanah through Yom Kippur. If one errs, and does not correct himself before starting the next Brachah, one must start the Amidah again from the beginning.
- 8. The other changes in the Amidah during Aseret Ymei Teshuva are:
  - a. HaMelech HaMishpat instead of Melech Ohev Tzedaka Umishpat
  - b. the inclusion of:
    - ....Zachreinu L'Chayim
    - ....Mi Kamocha
    - ....U'Chetov L'Chaim
    - ....B'Sfer Chayim and conclude the blessing with Oseh HaShalom

If mistakes are made in **a.** or **b.** one need not repeat the Amidah. 9. The minimum number of *Shofar* blasts necessary to fulfill the Mitzvah is **30** (i.e. three times *Tekiah Shvarim-Truah Tekiah*, three times *Tekiah Shvarim Tekiah*, three times *Tekiah Truah Tekiah*)

10. If you will be unable to hear Shofar in shul please contact Rabbi Claman to arrange to hear Shofar. To volunteer to blow Shofar please contact Rabbi Claman. You can also request a shofar blowing or volunteer through this form: https://www.yih.org/shofarblowing

#### **FAST OF GEDALIAH**

The day after *Rosh HaShanah* is *Tzom Gedaliah*, the fast of Gedaliah. This year the fast is observed on Thursday, September 25. The fast begins at 6:02 am and the fast ends at 7:48 pm. Gedaliah, Governor of Judea, was assassinated, and with his death all hope of preserving national freedom faded. This occurred when the wicked King Nebuchadnezer had issued harsh decrees upon the Jews. He had destroyed the first Holy Temple in 586 B.C.E. and exiled the Jews to Babylonia for 70 years.

#### YOM KIPPUR

- 1. It is a Mitzvah to eat heartily on *Erev Yom Kippur*.
- 2. It is customary for men to go to the *Mikveh* in preparation of *Yom Kippur*.
- 3. We *daven Minchah* prior to the final meal--*Se'udah*--and include *Viduy*--confession of our sins.

4. Before lighting the candles, the women say this brachah: *Lehadlik ner shel Yom Hakipurim*.

The *Shehechiyanu* may be recited then also, but only if one is accepting *Yom Tov* at that time. If the woman plans to ride to shul for *Kol Nidre*, she should have in mind and say at candle lighting time that she is not accepting *Yom Kippur* then, and she should not recite the *Shehechiyanu* at candle lighting, but rather after *Kol Nidre* with the *Chazzan*.

- 5. **Prohibited** on *Yom Kippur* are:
  - a. eating and drinking,
  - b. washing (this includes brushing one's teeth, using mouthwash/mouthwash strips)
  - c. smearing ointment (e.g. hair tonic, deodorant, perfume),
  - d. wearing leather shoes,
  - e. marital relations,
  - f. all the prohibitions of Shabbat.

6. For *Havdallah* after *Yom Kippur*, we say the *Brachah* over the wine, the candle (lit from a fire burning during *Yom Kippur*) and *Hamavdil*.

#### TIPS FOR AN EASY FAST

Here are some quick tips to make your Yom Kippur fast a bit more bearable:

- The day before the fast begins, drink plenty of water.
- Eat a balanced meal before the fast. Proteins and fats are absorbed more slowly than sugars and provide the necessary energy, but you should balance your meal with 55% complex carbohydrates, 15% proteins, and 30% fats.
- Your last meal should include complex carbohydrates like pasta, rice, potatoes and wholegrain bread. When complex carbohydrates are stored in the liver, water is retained so the body suffers less dehydration during a fast.
- Do not overeat before you fast.
- Avoid salty or sweet beverages/foods before the fast, they may make you thirsty.
- The best way to break the fast: Drink a non-carbonated beverage and eat a slice of bread or dry cake. After an hour, enjoy a full meal.

#### Special Parental Blessing to Children on Erev Yom Kippur

It has become a widely accepted custom for parents to bless their children before Yom Kippur. The placing of both hands upon the child's head when conferring the blessing, symbolizes that the blessing is bestowed with fullness of spirit and heart.

May the Almighty grant you children who will [grow up to] be righteous, occupying themselves with Torah and mitzvot all their days. May your source be blessed, and may He grant that your livelihood come with honesty, ease and abundance, from His generous hand, and not from the gifts of men; a livelihood that will free you to serve God. May you be inscribed and sealed for good, long life together with all the righteous of Yisrael. Amen.



#### SUKKOT LAWS & CUSTOMS



#### BUILDING THE SUKKAH

- 1. A rectangular sukkah must have at least two complete walls and at least a partial third wall.
- The walls must be strong enough to withstand a normal wind.
- 3. The walls may be a permanent structure.
- 4. The covering of the *sukkah*, (*s'chach*), must be of vegetable origin and detached from the ground. Branches, pine, bamboo poles, or wooden slats are appropriate. If branches are used, one should use a type which will not dry out before Sukkot ends. If bamboo is used, make sure it is not split.
- 5. The *s'chach* cannot be stolen; consequently one must secure permission from the landowner before cutting.
- 6. The *s'chach* must shade the majority of the area of the sukkah. It should not be able to offer shelter from the rain.
- 7. The *sukkah* cannot be built under any projection (e.g. ledge, overhang or trees.
- 8. The *s'chach* may not rest directly upon something which is susceptible to ritual impurity.
- 9. The *sukkah* should be decorated. The decorations are *muktzah* (not permitted to be touched on Shabbat and Yom Tov) and are prohibited for any use until after *Simchat Torah*.
- 10. For further elaboration, consult the Rabbis. They make "hut calls".

#### THE MITZVAH OF SUKKAH

- 1. The *mitzvah* of *sukkah* is to make it your residence (e.g. eating, sleeping, learning socializing). If the weather causes discomfort, one is exempt from doing all of one's activities in the sukkah. Nevertheless, one should be willing to be discomforted to a degree in order to at least eat their meals in the sukkah. If it is raining, one is exempt even from eating in the sukkah.
- 2. Ideally, all food should be consumed only in a sukkah. Before eating, one makes the brachah over the food and the *brachah* of *leishev ba-sukkah*.
- 3. One eats in the sukkah on *Shemini Atzeret* but without the *brachah* of *leishev ba-sukkah*
- 4. On the first two nights, one must say *Kiddush* after nightfall and eat bread in the *sukkah*, even if it means waiting for a while for the rain to stop.
- 5. In *Kiddush* on the first night, the *Shehechiyanu* is recited after the *leishev ba-sukkah*, for the *Shehechiyanu* applies to the *mitzvah* of *sukkah* and its construction. After the first night, the *leishev ba-sukkah* is said after the *Shehechiyanu* because the *Shehechiyanu* applies only to the holiday and not the *sukkah*. (Some have the custom to keep the order of the blessings on the second night just like the first night.)
- 6. Women are exempt from eating in the *sukkah*, but fulfill the *mitzvah* when they do so.

#### THE FOUR SPECIES

- 1. The *mitzvah* is that each man hold a *lulav* (palm), *etrog* (citron), 3 *hadasim* (myrtle branches) and 2 *aravot* (willow branches) together on *Sukkot*, during the daytime.
- 2. Although not obligated to perform the *mitzvah*, women can fulfill the *mitzvah*.
- 3. One holds the *lulav*, with the spine facing him, the myrtle on the right, willow on the left, all with the right hand. Hold the *etrog*, upside down, in the left hand. Left-handed *Ashkenazim* hold the *lulav* in the left hand and the *etrog* in the right. Make the brachah *(al netilat lulav)* (on the first day, add *Shehechiyanu*.) Turn the etrog upright, hold all four species together and shake them 3 times in the following directions, in this order: east, south, west, north, up, and down (symbolic of *Hashem*'s total dominion over the universe.)
- 4. One must own the 4 species legally for the performance of the mitzvah. If a friend does not own a set, give him yours for the mitzvah and then ask for it in return. A loan arrangement is not good enough.
- 5. If *tefillin* are worn on *Chol HaMoed*, one should remove them before taking the *lulav* and *etrog* (i.e. before *Hallel*.)
- 6. The 4 species are not used on *Shabbat Sukkot*, and, except for the *etrog*, are *muktzah* (forbidden to be handled.)

#### **ETROG**

- 1. The *etrog* should not be dried up or punctured.
- 2. Its *pitum*—(a protuberance at the opposite end from the point of detachment from the tree) has to be attached. If the *etrog* never had a *pitum*, it is still kosher.

#### **HADASIM**

- 1. The myrtle must be 12 inches long. (3 *tefachim*)
- 2. For the majority of its length, the leaves must grow in clusters of 3 from the same point on the stem; and in its entirety, the leaves must cover the stem.

#### **LULAV**

- It is not kosher if its tip is broken or its central spine is split for the majority of its length.
- 2. The *lulav* must be at least 16 inches in length (4 *tefachim*)

#### **ARAVOT**

- 1. The willow must be of the species whose leaves turn red when mature.
- 2. The edges of the leaves must either be smooth or obtusely serrated, not actually serrated.
- 3. The minimum length of a willow branch is 12 inches. (3 *tefachim*)
- 4. If the leaves fall off at the touch of a fingernail, the *aravot* are not acceptable and must be replaced.



#### SUKKOT LAWS & CUSTOMS



#### TREATMENT

Wrap the *lulav* with the myrtle and willow in a wet towel or in plastic which contains a wet sponge or wet cloth. After the holiday, the 4 species should not be discarded like trash. One may eat the etrog. The *hadasim* can be allowed to dry, and then may be crushed to be used as spices for *havdallah*. The willow and lulay should be burned with the *chometz* before *Pesach*.

#### **PRAYERS**

- Ya'aleh Ve'yavo is added to Shmoneh Esreh and to Birkat HaMazon.
- 2. Whole *Hallel* is recited and the 4 species are taken and pointed during the course of *Hallel*.
- 3. *Hoshanot* are added each day with a lengthy service of *Hoshanot* on *Hoshanah Rabbah*.
- 4. **Tefilat Geshem** (Prayer for Rain) is added on *Shemini*Atzeret in *Musaf* and thereafter we begin saying **Mashiv**HaRuach
- 5. If one forgot *Mashiv HaRuach* he must repeat the *tefillah* from the beginning. If one is in doubt whether he said it, he must repeat the *tefillah* if it is within 30 days of *Shemini Atzeret*.
