Rabbi Weinstock's Message:

THIS YOM KIPPUR, BE THE INSPIRATION

Capt. Yaron Eliezer Chitiz, born in South Africa and raised in Ra'anana, was a 23-year-old deputy company commander who served in the Shaked Battalion of the Givati Brigade. He was killed in northern Gaza on December 26, 2023. During the year of mourning Yaron's father, Clive Chitiz, was traveling back to Israel from London. When he showed up for his flight on Friday, he told the El Al security representative that he really needed the flight to leave on time so he could make it back to his shul in Ra'anana for Shabbos, where he could say Kaddish for his fallen son. He explained that he had promised himself to say Kaddish at least once a day so he really needed to get home on time. The agent explained that she was only on the security team and had no information about the flight's departure. Clive thanked her and started walking toward the gate, still a little nervous about the timing. A few minutes later, his phone rang. "Hi, this is Jasmine from security. To be honest, I didn't even know what Kaddish was, so I Googled it. I learned that to say Kaddish, you need at least ten men over the age of thirteen. I hope you don't mind, but I took the liberty of asking a few men to meet me by the gate so you can say Kaddish before you board." Clive began to cry and ran toward the gate. When he got there, he did not find ten men. Clive found every single man over the age of thirteen on his flight waiting for him at the gate. The men who helped make the minyan deserve recognition. But I want to highlight Jasmine, the security agent. She had an experience that touched her. That experience triggered a thought, which led to an emotion, which led to action. She connected with a bereaved father, took it upon herself to learn, and then acted in a compassionate way. It is one thing to be inspired. It is another thing to translate inspiration into impact. And sometimes, the most important realization is that we are not only waiting for someone to inspire us.

We may be the person someone else is waiting for. A student once came to the Baal Shem Tov shortly before Rosh Hashanah and told him that he wanted to meet Eliyahu Hanavi. The Baal Shem Tov instructed him to travel to a small, ramshackle cottage in a faraway forest. After an arduous three-day journey, the student arrived and found only a poor widow and her children. She kindly invited him to spend Rosh Hashanah with them, though she had hardly a piece of bread to offer for the holiday meal. Fortunately, the man had brought food for his journey, and he shared it with the family. For two days, he anxiously awaited the appearance of Eliyahu Hanavi, but it never happened. Disappointed, he returned to his Rebbe. The Baal Shem Tov assured him that Eliyahu had been there and told him to return to the hut in the forest for Yom Kippur. This time, the student arrived shortly before Yom Kippur began. From inside the home, he heard the children crying bitterly, "Mother, we have nothing at all to eat. How will we prepare for Yom Kippur? We are starving!" "Be calm," said the mother. "Just like Hashem sent Eliyahu Hanavi to visit us on Rosh Hashanah, surely He will do it again." As Yom Kippur begins, we are looking for inspiration: something we can read, someone we can listen to, someone near us who can inspire us with their kavanah and their davening. But perhaps Yom Kippur is also a time to realize that we can have impact by being an inspiration for others. We can be a force of good that someone else needs. We can take an experience that moves us, turn it into action, and become someone's Eliyahu Hanavi. Sometimes you might be searching for Eliyahu Hanavi, only to discover that you are the one who has been sent. This Yom Kippur, we should be blessed with the clarity and courage to not only seek out inspiration, but to become an inspiration for others.
